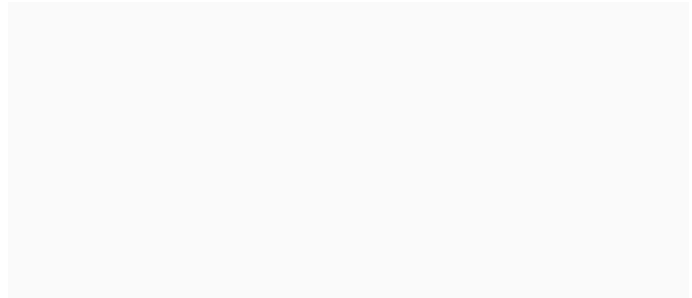

Recap of October 31, 2022 Chapter Meeting, featuring Northwestern University audiology students and ,Dr.Liz Meyer

Our Chapter has had a long and wonderful working relationship with the Audiology Department at Northwestern University. Many NW professors have been popular guest speakers on a variety of hearing related topics. One of my favorite Chapter events was first started over ten years ago when Dr.

Pamela Souza brought her audiology students for a round table discussion to meet with members of our Chapter at the NSSC.

This year on Monday, October 31st, Dr. Liz Meyer and her audiology students met with members of our Chapter on zoom. A list of questions was submitted prior to our meeting and, much to my surprise, many of the questions related specifically to cochlear implants - something that I can speak to since I have bilateral CI's. In fact, many of our Chapter members that participated in the meeting have at least one CI and others are contemplating CI surgery. Some of the questions were: what was involved in making our decision to proceed with CI surgery, what were our expectations and fears before surgery, what was our recovery/adjustment/rehabilitation like, what assistive devices do we like to use, and what specifically can be improved in the field of audiology? Great questions! And we had some great answers!

We, of course, took advantage of our time with the students to talk about the importance of having a tcoil in order to access hearing loops. We also urged the students to refer their patients to groups like ours to share and learn from others what it is like to live well with hearing loss.
